Pastor's Page

Peace be with you!

We thank God that He has been keeping us safe since the outbreak of the Coronavirus pandemic. He is a faithful God, He never forsakes us or leaves us, and His grace is always sufficient for us. Normally, when we see our friends, we like to shake their hands and hug each other to show our friendliness. However, for the past two months, we all have learned to do many things we never did before, like social distancing, wearing face masks and air hugging. We see people, with their face masks on, talking to their friends at least 6 feet apart from each other. It is really strange for us to do that, for we cannot tell from their face masks if they are happy, sad or mad. Maybe we should all draw a smiley, happy face on our face masks to let others know that we are still friendly.

Here at St. Paul's, we also have to learn to do things in some new and creative ways.

Since the middle of Lent, we have been recording and live streaming our worship services so that people can stay at home to be safe from COVID-19 and still worship with others online. Also, we have done drivein services in our church parking lot and "in person continuous worship services" on Sunday mornings with the limit of 10 people or less. These may not be the ideal ways of worshiping, but they do teach us not to take things for granted and appreciate more when we can go back for our regular church worship services.

Most of us are familiar with the hymn, "Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing" written by Robert Robinson in 1758. The second verse of the song begins with these words: "Here I raise my Ebenezer."

The word, "Ebenezer" means stone of help.

To understand this word, we have to go to the story in First Samuel, chapter seven. There, we read when the Philistines were ready to attack Israel, God's people cried out to Him for help and He answered them.

"The Lord thundered with a mighty sound that day against the Philistines and threw them into confusion, and they were defeated before Israel. And the men of Israel went out from Mizpah and pursued the Philistines and struck them, as far as below Beth-car. Then Samuel took a stone and set it up between Mizpah and Shen and called its name Ebenezer; for he said, 'Till now the Lord has helped us.'" (1 Samuel 7:10-12)

As we look back on what we have been through these past two months, we see not only challenges and struggles but also God's abundant grace and unending mercy. He provided us not only food and drink we needed for our body, but also His presence and guidance in every step we had to travel and every decision we had to make. When we did not know how to keep our worship services going, God provided the right tools, means and people to keep us staying in His Word.

All this reminds us that we are still in the wilderness, we are not in the Promised Land yet. Just like when the Israelites were in the wilderness, God provided food and water for them, today He takes care of our bodily needs. Further, just like God was with them with a pillar of fire by night and a pillar of cloud by day, today He is with us in His Word and Sacraments.

For this we can say with the Prophet Samuel, "Till now the Lord has helped us," and we can also sing with the hymn writer Robert Robinson ""Here I raise my Ebenezer." Amen .

If your child does the majority of the work that is asked of him/ her and shows competency in the work, they will be promoted to the next grade. The Plan is written for Kindergarten through Fifth, as those grades are under the Department of Education. Preschool will follow the path of the rest of the school. COVID –19 Activities for Families

Are you one of the many mothers or fathers looking for ways to fill your child's extra time at home with positive, Godly activities each day? This can seem like a daunting task and added complexity to the "new normal" of balancing social distancing, homeschooling, Sunday schooling, work and more. However, Godly activities that are engaging can be both easy and meaningful. Here are three Simple and Engaging Godly Activities for Families:

Morning Letterboard Devotions

Letterboards are a fun way to create your own message and incorporate it as décor in your daily life. However, you

I NEED CAKE BECAUSE MONDAY. can use that simple letter board for more than décor, it can be a spring-board into a simple and meaningful morning devotion. Set up a rotating schedule that puts one family member in charge of coming up with the "message of the day". If a child is too young, pair them up with an older sibling or parent that might help them. It can be a few words from a bible verse, a meaningful phrase referencing the Lord, or you can reference a bible verse (i.e. John 3:16). Then, the family will gather at the same time each day (if possible, in the morning) to talk about the new message on the letterboard. Have the creator explain why they chose the message and how it applies to them. Engage the rest of the family in a discussion of what it means to them and how it applies to them. Close with a prayer and put the letterboard where everyone can see it throughout the day and be reminded of the meaning.

Living Prayer List

What's simpler than a piece of paper hanging on the fridge? Not much! That's why a "living" prayer list is super easy to do. Engaging the whole family about who to pray for helps take the focus off of our own worries and helps focus on what we can do for others. And prayer is powerful! What better way to teach your kids the importance of daily prayer. Add a new name, or group of people (like nurses), each day at dinner time. In addition to your regular dinner prayer, include the newest prayer list addition in the prayer. Continue to build the list at dinner time one addition at a time. Encourage your



children to pray throughout the day and before they go to bed for all the names and groups of people on the prayer list.

Blessings Jar

It's easy to get wrapped up in the worries. Worry about catching the virus, worry about spreading the virus to others,



worry about death, worry about the economy, worry about losing a job, worry about not seeing friends or family, worry about when this will end. The list goes on and on. A "Blessings Jar" takes that worry and flips it around by focusing on the many blessings. You can use a mason jar with lid or whatever you have around the house. It demonstrates how the Lord provides for us, loves us and takes care of us. Before the end of the day, each family member will write down a blessing on a small slip of paper and put in in the blessings jar. This continues each day of the week until Sunday. After whatever form of worship takes place (listening on radio, watching on Facebook or TV, or reading the Pastor's service via email) open the lid and read out all the blessings for the week. The blessing jar is a really simple way to look around and be thankful for food,

shelter, clothing, clean water, family, electricity, good health, technology to help us communicate, and so much more.

As the parent, be that example they need to see. Someone that trusts fully in the Lord. That's not to say you can't share your worries, you certainly can and should, but always reaffirm that God's got this – God's got you – God's got me – God's got us. "Fear not, for I am with you; be not dismayed, for I am your God; I will strengthen you, I will help you, I will uphold you with my righteous right hand." Isaiah 41:10
